

Know Your ICOG Chairperson: Dr Parag Biniwale



Dr Parag Biniwale, eminent obstetrician & gynaecologist from Pune was recently Installed as 20th Chairperson of Indian College of Obstetricians & Gynaecologist during the AICOG held in Mumbai on 11th January 2025. He is first Obgyn from Pune to be holding this post.

Dr Parag was born on 25 th April 1967 to Mrs Anuradha & Dr Anand Biniwale. Dr Anand is a general practitioner who is still working at the age of 91 &

Mrs Anuradha is a home maker who devoted time to all het three sons who went on to become doctors. Dr Parag did his schooling from modern high School; he was always good in academics. He joined Fergusson college and secured admission in prestigious Byramjee Jeejibhoy Government medical college in 1984. Dr Parag then joined Dept of Obstetrics & Gynaecology for post-graduation in 1990 and completed MD in December 1993.

Dr Parag joined as research officer in Human Research reproduction centre of ICMR in BJ medical college where he was exposed to field of social obstetrics & was part of project on Norplant, MMA pills & Itraconazole. His passion always was labour and birthing with his thesis on Active management of labour.

Dr Parag joined Dept of Ob Gy at Kamala Nehru hospital run by Pune Municipal corporation & Bharati Vidyapeeth medical college as Honorary lecturer in 1997. He continues to a postgraduate teacher and unit head at Kamala Nehru hospital and taught numerous students. He also was post graduate Guide for DNB at Dr Patankar Medical foundation and has guided students for their thesis from 2006-2014.

Dr Parag became life member of Pune Obstetric & Gynaecological Society (POGS) 1990 and became managing committee member in 1996.

As President of POGS, Dr Parag initiated lot of activities, Online PG classes & quiz for students, outreach programs in periphery of Pune, monthly newsletter which contained member achievements apart from society activities & scientific material. POGS started its journal "Journal of Obstetric and Gynaecological Practices POGS" in 2022 which now an indexed journal by Directory of Open Access journals in February 2025 in less than three years time. He also encouraged Past presidents to donate and started Prizes in POGS for annual conference & for research.

Dr Parag became member of Indian college of Obstetricians & Gynaecologist (ICOG) in 2006 and a fellow in 2007. Dr Parag was installed as Chairman in a grand ceremony on 11th January 2025 during AICOG Mumbai. He has initiated new activities for ICOG; Academic & perspectives; Hormony PG classes on Gynae endocrinology (with endocrinology committee of FOGSI) & Teachers training program as per new norms by NMC.

Dr Parag has been invited at more than 170 FOGSI societies to deliver lectures & orations.

Dr Parag has edited 3 books Fundamentals of research for Obstetricians & Gynaecologists, Thyroid diseases and women PCOS. He has been co-editor of books "Gynaecological manual on adolescent girl & Young women", "Year book of Ob Gyn 2019", "exploring new horizons of Ob Gyn". He has contributed numerous chapters to FOGSI publications and FOGSI text book. He has over 20 published articles in various journals.

Dr Parag has been an avid sportsman form his college days. He represented Pune university to win All India championships in Badminton and had also represented Maharashtra State in nationals. He has fond of travelling as well.

Dr Parag is married to Dr Vaishali who is well known obstetrician & gynaecologist herself and written several articles in magazines & newspapers apart form a book on pregnancy and child birth. His elder son and daughter in law are mechanical engineers and are working in USA while his younger son & daughter in law are dentists and are working in Canada.

It was an initiative of Thalassemics India bringing together distinguished experts, policymakers, and stakeholders committed to advancing care and policies for thalassaemia patients. The event was graced by Her Highness Sheikha Sheikha Bint Saif Al-Nahyan as the esteemed special guest, she is the Chairperson of the Board of Directors of the Emirates Thalassaemia Society. Eminent personality Dr. Vinod K. Paul, a member of NITI Ayog Government of India delivered the keynote address and stressed the urgent need for collective action of all stakeholders. He appreciated the preconception care and 'swasth Janam Abhiyaan' vision of the FOGSI President and promised all support for this mission from FOGSI. He also requested the government body to look into the preventive part.

Crucial topics such as safe blood transfusions, the establishment of a national registry, bridging gaps in care, and strengthening networking efforts were thoroughly explored with groundbreaking insights on emerging therapies. The interactive session on Gene therapy and Stem cell registry proved to be an eye-opener, shedding light on newer prospects for treatment. Additionally, healthcare accessibility under NHM and Ayushman Bharat PM-JAY initiative was praised.

One of the most profound and inspiring aspects of the conclave was that the entire program was managed by thalassaemia warriors themselves, demonstrating their resilience and determination. Anchor Aubha Taneja, brought a heartfelt touch to the proceedings, making a lasting impact on everyone present.






State President's Column - BOGS

The Bengal Obstetric and Gynaecological Society Vision Statement for 2024-25 and Activities I took over as President, The Bengal Obstetric and Gynaecological Society (BOGS) on 25th July 2024 during the Foundation Day Celebrations at the Oberoi Grand, Kolkata. I was the third generation in our family to lead BOGS after my great grandfather Dr Bamandas Mukhejee (1938) and my father Dr Basudeb Mukherjee (2000). I knew the expectations would be huge and I started planning for the year well in advance. Dr Amit Basu took over with me as Secretary and Dr Mahua Bhattacharya as the Clinical Secretary.

As we are in the middle of the academic year, the vision statement goes on to include some of the notable work we have done as a society over the last few months. The theme chosen for the year was 'Bridging Gaps, Creating Impact'. There are several gaps in our health care system and the plan were to bridge some of them.

The broad aim was to carry on the quality academic events and combine it with health awareness and projects with a social touch. We also had a focus on keeping projects environment friendly and minimizing our carbon footprint. Our plan through the year was to strongly stand by the FOGSI leadership taking their cues and plans to the society locally. We have conducted programs with several of the committees and look forward to do more during the upcoming VPCON conference in April. We also conducted locally several of the FOGSI President-initiated projects supported by industry partners.

We declared the calendar dates of the managing committee meetings for the entire year on day one of taking over. We chose two weekdays which we alternated through the year to allow members with inconvenience on one particular day to attend the other day and maximize attendance. We banned plastic from our office building shifting to glass bottles, added fruits to the menu during meetings for the health-conscious, worked towards less paper print outs and decrease clutter in the office. We added indoor potted plants in the building, banned smoking in the building and got a pest control contract instituted.

Very early in the year, we stumbled on the Abhaya incident in RG Kar Hospital. We had not foreseen it and several planned events had to be deferred. The 'Abhaya' movement brought members of the Bengal Society together. From joining rallies, organizing protests, sitting in for hunger strikes, raising funds for legal intervention, keeping national friends abreast of the situation, showcasing the cause in medical conferences, inspiring FOGSI to the '100 days and counting' project – the members did it all.

Our plan in the year was to partner with other organizations to bring more expertise and quality to our programs. In our flagship Annual Conference, we partnered with ISOPARB Kolkata, SOVSI Bengal, IAGE Bengal and RCOG IRC India East for the workshops. We planned a series of academic program called 'Confluence' involving other specialties who we frequently come across in our clinical work. They included Urology,

endocrinology, Neonatology, Anesthesia,
Orthopedics, Psychiatry, Cardiology and
Gastroenterology. The idea was to cover two
specialties in a day with 2.5hr pre-lunch and post
lunch sessions on Saturdays are held once in two
months. Thread bare discussion and
troubleshooting on the specialties with experts
would be held. We identified the named health
days of the year well in advance and decided to
have some activities in the form of either a physical
CME, webinar, radio message, video message
or social media creatives. We also announced
competitions for slogans and essays, photographs
etc. on some of the days.

Initiated by Dr Bhaskar Pal, for the last few years, we have a Yuva Conference in our society involving all faculty < 45yrs in age. This year we went one step further to allow only Yuvas to lead the organizing committee. We also instituted Yuva Icon and Yuva Excellence Awards to acknowledge their exemplary contribution to BOGS over the years.

For Health Awareness among Public and Health Camps we partnered with NGOs already working in the field which helped us to reach beneficiaries needing the service.

Our work took us to Baharampur (200kms from Kolkata) and Malda (350km from Kolkata) besides serving in the city slums. We also reached out to schools and colleges for health awareness seminars specially highlighting the issues of menstrual hygiene, nutrition, soft skills and mental health. There was a focus on Cervical Cancer Vaccines. On the World Cancer Day, the Bengal Society walked the talk partnering with Serum Institute and vaccinating 238 schoolgirls between the age of 9-14yrs with Cervical Cancer Vaccines. These vaccines were given free of cost, funds being generated from the Bengal society, RCOG East Zone and Rotary. BOGS had a one-day stand-alone seminar dedicated to Vaccination in Women. NNF, IAP, Rotary and UNICEF were partners for the program. Pledges for vaccination were taken, donors were acknowledged and the results of the survey done on 225 members on vaccination practices was announced. Other stand-alone events included a seminar on Violence Against Women. Here we involved FOGSI, Swayam and other NGOs working in the field of human trafficking and VAW. We also

took the opportunity to take pledges to stand up against all forms of VAW and to felicitate champions from the community who we identified who are doing commendable work in this field.

With UNICEF in the World Breast Feeding Week, we had a mega program involving 400+ nursing students and tutors focusing on the Early Initiation

of Breast Feeding.

It is important in any professional society to have social engagement functions among the members and their families to build a sense of fellowship and enhance bonding.

There were occasions including a picnic in a garden-house for all members including office staff. We celebrated together the moment when Dr Bhaskar Pal won the FOGSI President Elections and shared the sorrow together in the condolence meeting we held when we lost three of our senior members including a past president of the society. The Bengal Society has been a founder society of FOGSI and established in 1936. It has 1200+ members mostly in and around Kolkata. It has given FOGSI eight Presidents and has always stood steadfast with the FOGSI leadership. The AICOG held in 2023 at Kolkata is considered by many as one of the best FOGSI has seen. We expect the Bengal Society to lead the way in the future and provide inspiration for many other FOGSI societies across India in the years to come.

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

Legends of **Dr Anandibai Joshi.....** A Tribute to First Indian Woman Medical Professional...



Anandibai Gopalrao Joshi was first Indian female doctor of modern medicine. She was the first lady from India, then British India, who araduated from Woman' s Medical College of Pennsylvania in 1886. Born in a conservative Hindu family, on 31 March 1865, at Bombay Preidency, Yamuna, was married at

the age of nine to Gopalrao Joshi.

This was a child marriage in accordance to traditions of that time.

Gopalrao renamed her as Anandi. Unusual for that time, Gopalrao was progressive thinker. He was working in postal services. He supported Anandibai's education.

Situation of medical care was very unsatisfactory in our country in those times.

Anandibai gave birth to a boy at fourteen years of her age, the neonate died ten days after birth due to lack of medical care. This incidence disturbed her and she made up her mind to become a doctor. Gopalrao and Anandibai moved to Kolkata (Calcutta). She learnt English and Sanskrit there. Her husband communicated with Royal Wilder, an American missionary, and mentioned his wife 's interest in learning medicine.

Theodicia Carpenter, a lady from New Jersey, happened to read that conversation and decided to help Anandibai. At Serampore College Hall, Kolkata, it was Anandibai, who explained the importance of female doctors in care of women of our country.

Anandibai travelled to New York from Kolkata by ship. She



was received by Theodicia Carpenter. Anandibai began medical education after Dean of college, Dr Rachel Bodley enrolled her.

She passed her MD at 1886. She was 19 years of age at that tine. Her topic of thesis was Obstetrics among the Aryan Hindus.

On her graduation, she was congratulated by Queen Victoria herself.

The state of Kolhapur appoined her as incharge of female ward of local Albert Edward Hospital

She died due to tuberculosis at age 22.

She was a legend herself. She was an example of grit and determination. With great resilience she fought with adverse situation and opened the doors of medical education to women in India. She was a trailblazer and trendsetter in true sense.

American writer Carolina wells wrote her biography. Doordarshan ran Anandi- Gopal, a serial on her life. Dr Anjali Kirtane wrote a Marathi book on her life.

Government of Maharashtra awards a fellowship in her name for young women working on women's health. IRDS (Institute of Research and Dicumentation in Social Sciences) from Lucknow, awards women in field of medicine, in her name.

On 31March 2018, Google honored her with Google Doodle to mark her 153 rd birth aniversary.

Anandibai Joshi was a true pioneer because she challenged deep rooted social norms, inspired future generations, and laid the groundwork for women in medicine in India. Her legacy continues to empower women to pursue medical education and careers in healthcare.

We salute her and acknowledge her pioneering work for all of us.

Endometriosis and Infertility

Introduction

Endometriosis is an estrogen-dependent benign inflammatory disease characterized by the presence of ectopic endometrial implants.1 The most common sites of endometriosis, in decreasing order, are the ovaries, anterior/posterior cul-de-sac, broad ligaments and uterosacral ligaments, uterus, fallopian tubes, sigmoid colon and appendix. Because the growth of the implants is dependent on ovarian produced steroids, it is a disease that most severely affects women ages 25-35 years.2 Patients can present with a wide range of symptoms ranging from being asymptomatic to infertile. Endometriosis has been estimated to affect up to 10-15% of reproductive aged women.³ The association between endometriosis and infertility is well supported throughout literature, but a definite cause-effect relationship is still controversial. The prevalence of endometriosis increases dramatically to as high as 25%-50% in women with infertility and 30-50% of women with endometriosis have infertility.4 Studies have suggested that women with more advanced endometriosis have poor ovarian reserve, low oocyte and embryo quality, and poor implantation.5

Pathogenesis

Endometriosis is a multifactorial and systemic disease that has pleiotropic direct and indirect effects on reproduction. Chronic inflammation and hormonal dependance are the main underlying

pathophysiologic mechanisms that drive endometriosis, and the association of these two key biological features make the natural history of this disease distinct. A complex interaction between endometriosis subtype, pain, inflammation, altered pelvic anatomy, adhesions, disrupted ovarian reserve/function, and compromised endometrial receptivity as well as systemic effects of the disease define endometriosis-associated infertility. Pelvic anatomy becomes distorted and fecundity is reduced via mechanical disruptions such as pelvic adhesions. These disruptions impair oocyte release or pick-up, alter sperm motility, cause disordered myometrial contractions, as well as impair fertilization and embryo transport. Women who are infertile are more likely to have advanced stages of the disease.8 However, there is still much speculation about the proposed mechanisms by which mild disease impacts fertility³. Inflammatory cytokines, growth and angiogenic factors, and aberrantly expressed genes are all being explored as potential etiologic factors of endometriosis-associated infertility. Inflammatory effects resulting from the presence of endometriomas have been shown to affect both oocyte production and ovulation in the affected ovary.7 There is also a luteal phase disruption in endometriosis that may result from progesterone receptor dysregulation as well as an effect on progesterone target genes, which in turn leads to decreased endometrial receptivity.7 Sperm quality or function is also decreased and has been proposed to be from the inflammatory/toxic affects of the peritoneal fluid and increased activated macrophages.8 The increased number of inflammatory cells in the peritoneal fluid not only damage the oocytes and sperm, but have also been shown to have toxic effects on the embryo.9 Progesterone resistance and dysregulation of progesterone receptors also appear to play a role in implantation failure. Because progesterone induces endometrial decidualization during the luteal phase, its presence is crucial for a normal pregnancy. Progesterone receptors have been shown to be dysregulated in both eutopic and ectopic endometrium. Down-regulation of receptors is seen prior to implantation in normal endometrium, but is delayed in the endometrium of endometriosis. 10 In addition, both eutopic and ectopic endometrium have been shown to be resistant to progesterone, causing an unopposed estrogen state which is likely not suitable for implantation.11

Treatment of Endometriosis-Associated InfertilityCurrent treatment of endometriosis-associated infertility focuses on improving fecundity by




Fig 2: Main pathophysiological processes implicated in endometriosis associated infertility. ⁶

removing or reducing ectopic endometrial implants and restoring normal pelvic anatomy.¹² A wide spectrum of treatment options have been examined including expectant management, medical treatment, surgical treatment, and assisted reproductive technology. While the option of expectant management may be reasonable for patients with mild-moderate disease, it is only delaying the start of effective treatment in those with severe disease. Patient counselling must consider the severity of endometriosis. A 2010 Cochran review looked at 25 trials of ovulation suppressive agents (danazol, progestins, oral contraceptives, GnRHa) in women with endometriosis-associated infertility who wished to conceive. Not only was there no benefit from ovulation suppression, but it also delayed the patient from having a live birth while taking the suppressive agents.¹³ As a general rule, medical therapy should be discouraged in patients with endometriosis and subfertility who desire a live birth.13 The exception to this rule is in patients undergoing in-vitro fertilization (IVF). Multiple studies have shown that prolonged GnRHa treatment prior to IVF may improve fertility rates in advanced endometriosis.14 Proposed mechanisms are by means of increased retrieved oocytes, higher implantation rates, and reduced preclinical abortions. Like GnRHa, the use of oral contraceptives has also been shown to improve outcomes when given for 6-8 weeks prior to ART. Needless to say, data regarding suppressive therapy pre-ART in patients with endometriomas is still evolving but shows promise for improving endometriosis related infertility when used in conjunction with IVF.

Surgical treatment of endometriosis-associated infertility has proposed benefits in both severe and minimal-moderate

disease. Benefits of surgery in severe disease include restoration of pelvic anatomy, removal of implants and endometriomas, and resulting decreased inflammation.¹⁵ Laparoscopic surgery is preferred to laparotomy; it is more cost effective, has a shorter hospital stay and shorter recovery. Operative laparoscopy could be offered as a treatment option for stage I/II endometriosis as it improves the rate of ongoing pregnancy. Clinicians may consider laparoscopy for the treatment of endometrioma-associated infertility as it may increase their chance of natural pregnancy, although no data from comparative studies exist. Till date, no compelling evidence exists that operative laparoscopy for DE improves fertility, however it may represent a treatment option in symptomatic patients wishing to conceive. Thus, the decision to perform surgery should be guided by the presence or absence of pain symptoms, patient age and preferences, history of previous surgery, presence of other infertility factors, ovarian reserve, and estimated EFI. Although ovarian suppression in general

does not appear to have an advantage on subsequent fertility and surgery does increase natural fertility, a Cochrane review in 2020 evaluated whether in the perioperative period ovarian suppression may have an added benefit.16 Pre-operative medical therapy was administered with the intent of reducing the severity of endometriosis and thereby decreasing the risk and increasing the desired outcome of the surgery. The aim of post operative therapy was to increase resorption of residual deposits and reduce the recurrence of disease, however no trial reported increased fertility rates. The review concluded that women seeking pregnancy should not be prescribed postoperative hormone suppression with the sole purpose to enhance future pregnancy rates. Those women who cannot attempt to or decide not to conceive immediately after surgery may be offered hormone therapy as it does not negatively impact their fertility and improves the immediate outcome of surgery for pain.

Multiple randomized controlled trials have shown that ovulation induction and superovulation both with and without intrauterine insemination (IUI) increase fertility rates in patients without distorted anatomy. An important aspect to remember is that ovarian stimulation can also exacerbate endometriosis so it should be performed in a controlled manner and be limited to 3–4 cycles. In infertile women with stage I/II endometriosis, clinicians may perform intrauterine insemination (IUI) with ovarian stimulation, instead of expectant management or IUI alone, as it increases pregnancy rates. Although the value of IUI in infertile women with stage III/IV endometriosis with tubal patency is uncertain, the use of IUI with ovarian stimulation could be considered. To identify patients that may benefit from ART after surgery, the

Endometriosis Fertility Index (EFI) should be used as it is validated, reproducible and cost-effective.18 It is still uncertain how much endometriosis affects IVF success rates, IVF appears to be the most successful treatment option for patients with all stages of endometriosis. A specific protocol for ART in women with endometriosis cannot be recommended.18 Both GnRH antagonist and agonist protocols can be offered based on patients' and physicians' preferences as no difference in pregnancy or live birth rate has been demonstrated. The extended administration of GnRH agonist/contraceptive pills prior to ART treatment to improve live birth rate in infertile women with endometriosis is not recommended, as the benefit is uncertain.18 Clinicians are not recommended to routinely perform surgery for endometriomas prior to ART, however surgery for pain or accessibility of follicles can be considered.¹⁸ No recommendation supports any non-medical interventions (nutrition, Chinese medicine, electrotherapy, acupuncture, physiotherapy, exercise, and psychological interventions) to increase fertility in women with endometriosis. The potential benefits and harms are unclear.

Ultimately, the optimal method for treatment of endometriosis-associated infertility is an individualized decision that should be made on patient-specific basis. Many factors must be considered including but not limited to distorted pelvic anatomy, patient's ovarian reserve, partner semen analysis, age, presence of endometriomas, and length of infertility. If the patient is young, it is not unreasonable to discuss expectant management or ovulation induction (OI)/IUI as a first line therapy. If the patient is older and nearing 35, a more aggressive plan such as OI/ IUI or IVF +/- pre-IVF ovulation suppression should be discussed with her. For women with suspected stage III/IV endometriosis, IVF is recommended. If surgery is performed and the initial surgery does not restore fertility, IVF +/- pre-ART ovulation suppression is an effective alternative compared to repeat surgery although there is currently insufficient evidence to assess the benefit of surgery in addition to IVF on the outcomes of pregnancy.




